

Hot Shot Competition Begins Monday

The Durham Parks and Recreation Department and the Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co., of Durham will be conducting Pepsi-Cola/NBA Hot Shot Basketball Competition at all its summer program locations starting July 19, to August 18.

Pepsi-Cola/NBA Hot Shot is a national Recreation Program for community organizations, now entering its seventh year. It is the largest program of its kind involving more than 1,500 youth athletic groups and close to 2.5

million youngsters. Hot shot is a form of athletic competition based on a display of basketball skills. Winners from local youth organizations participate in area playoffs in 23 NBA cities. Area winners then go on to represent NBA teams in national competition.

(Continued from Page 5) baseball team said: "The south is no longer that backward, red neck breeding region that we used to read about. An area like the Triangle is very progressive. You have opera, symphony, rock and jazz clubs. Heck, you can even snow ski in the North Carolina mountains."

This mixture of northern inflow into already strong southern athletic programs is creating a monster that east, midwest, and west coast will have trouble subduing in the years to come.

Since the mid-1960s, black southern athletes who used to depart the region in droves for northern and midwestern teams are now staying home. This has helped to turn some programs around, virtually overnight.

Virginia, for example, used to be the laughing stock in all sports, but now has one of the most feared basketball programs.

UNC and Clemson can now field football teams that can compare with those at Notre Dame or Southern Cal. Arkansas and Texas used to only care about football, but both are now making national noises in basketball and baseball.

North Carolina for the past two years has had probably the best balanced men's and women's sports programs of any major school.

The small colleges are also reaping rewards. The NAIA football and basketball titles this past year were won by schools in the Carolinas.

Grambling continues to be a terror on the football field, as are Tennessee State and Elon.

In basketball, Virginia Union and the University of D.C. have won the past two NCAA Division II titles.

With the secondary schools receiving stronger and more varied support, the south has truly risen again on the collegiate sports scene.

Los Angeles

How well known is former world heavyweight champion Muhammed Ali?

John Rettie, a Los Angeles photojournalist, shed new light on Ali's international popularity after he returned from covering the Camel Trophy '82 off-road driving competition in the remote Highlands region of Papua New Guinea.

"One day we spoke with some children who attended school 50 miles from the nearest town," Rettie explains. "They didn't know what TV is, and they never heard of Ronald Reagan, but they know who Muhammad Ali is."

Rettie was one of several journalists who went to Papua New Guinea to cover Camel Trophy, an international off-road event sponsored by R.J. Reynolds Tobacco International. This year's event was won by an Italian driving team.

"New Guinea is still primitive, and the natives were extremely curious about our group," Rettie adds. "But some of the schools teach English, and when we mentioned Ali, the kids started yelling 'boxer, boxer' and flailed their fists in the air."

Battle, one of several people who appeared before the board Monday night to ask that it reconsider the action, said: "Presently our system has nine schools and two black principals. If this decision stands, we will be down to one and one-half black principals."

Battle said that he hoped the plan was not racially motivated but that he thought race tainted the entire decision.

According to Mrs. Dalton, Battle and other black parents and teachers present, the board made the decision on the Mayer plan behind closed doors after a heated public debate two weeks ago.

The final vote was four to three, with the white majority voting in favor of the program.

Mrs. Dalton said that many teachers were upset that a decision of such magnitude was made during the summer when many of the system's teachers were out of town.

"We are not questioning Dr. Mayer's professional credentials," Mrs. Dalton said during an interview. "We do not believe she is doing what is best for the system, the children, the parents, or the community."
