These ladies are attending the 86th Anniversary Convention of the NACWC and the 52nd Anniversary Convention of its National Association of Girls Clubs in Anchorage. The meetings were scheduled from July 31 through August 6.

Special post-convention tours are also taking place. Tour I, August 6-8, will visit Nome, the Arctic Gold Rush Capital, and Kotzebue. Tour II, Exotic Orient Tour, beginning August 6 and ending August 20, will take the travelers to Tokyo and six other Japanese cities: Hakone, Kyoto, Beppu, Kumamoto and Nagasaki.

NACWC is believed to be the oldest black women's organization, having been organized in 1895 in Boston, Mass. Its five point program sup-
