

Meharry Medical College which trains approximately 40 per cent of this nation's black doctors, was in danger of losing its accreditation.
The Liaison Committee
on Medical Education, which accredits medical schools nationwide, had found that Meharry students did not have enough access to pa-tients, and thus did not have enough practical healing experience. The dilemma prompted Dr. Richard Lester, president of Meharry Medical College to request Con-gressman Ford's aid.

Congressman Ford learned from Dr. Lester that if Meharry could gain access to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Nashville, Tennessee the problem could be alleviated.
