

Franklin Thomas Is Setting New Course For The Ford Foundation

The first black president of the Ford Foundation, Franklin Thomas, has \$120 million dollars a year to spend and urban poverty is his number one priority, says the October *Ebony*.

Human rights is another one of the six social programs that Thomas has instituted at the nation's largest and most influential foundation. His reshaping of programs and policies in addition to staff cuts were in-

itially criticized. Now it is said that the foundation runs with increased accountability and efficiency because of Thomas's three-and-one-half years of leadership. Thomas, 48 years old, says race may have been partly responsible for his early problems but he feels, "the basic element is that we were changing a circumstance that some found very comfortable."

The honor graduate of Columbia Law School won

the office over more than 30 candidates. Shortly before his appointment, Thomas turned down an offer to become Secretary of Housing and Urban Development because he told then President Carter the only job he wanted in Washington was the Presidency. Now Thomas is satisfied to hold what has been called one of the most powerful positions in America.

Black Writers Biographies Are Compiled In New Book

Scholars and others researching the lives of black writers will find biographical information easier with a book written by Dorothy W. Campbell, assistant professor of library science at North Carolina Central University.

Mrs. Campbell's book, *Index to Black American Writers in Collective Biographies*, will be published in February by Libraries Unlimited of Littleton, Colorado.

The book identifies references to black American writers and other black literary figures in 267 volumes of collective biography. The various

general reference works were published between 1837 and 1982. Some audiovisual collections and works for children are also indexed.

The more than 1,800 persons whose biographies are indexed include creative writers, biographers, historians, pioneer journalists, literary and social critics, illustrators of books, bibliographers, and others who have contributed to Afro-American culture. A few foreign authors who have lived and published in America are included.

The publisher expects the work to be of use to researchers, reference librarians, bibliographers, and students of black studies.
