Network Calls For National Response To KKK March

WASHINGTON Leaders of the nation's principal clearing-house for counter-Klan activity have issued a call for a major national response to the planned Ku Klux march

Washington on November 6. "The Klan must detect some sympathy from the heights of power," said Rev. C.T. Vivian, chair of the Atlanta-based National Anti-Klan Net-work. "The KKK is marching on Washington for the first time since 1926 and they can come because the Federal government has refused to stop their racist and religious violence in its tracks."

Billed as a "Rally for Dignity and Human Against Racist & Religious Violence" the Network leaders are hoping to show that the vast majority of American oppose the Klan. "The problem is not the lack of opposition sen-timents," said Vivian, "but that too many have stayed silent - hoping the Klan would just 'go away'. It is the passivity of America that has allowed the KKK to exist
