De-Wrinkle Garments

Even the best permanent press and synthetic garments get a few wrinkles when packed in a storage boxes or left in a suitcase or crowded closet for a while.

In most cases, they can be "de-wrinkled" by a good tumbling in the dryer, for about 10 minutes on the permanent cycle, says Dr. Judieth Mock, extension clothing specialist at North Carolina State University.
