

# Bahai's Plan Race Unity Conference Here February 19-20

"Eliminating Racism in This Generation: Working Toward a Permanent Solution" is the goal of a conference to be held February 19-20 at North Carolina Central University in association with the Bahai's of Durham County.

Following an opening address on Saturday morning by Mrs. Mary K. Radpour, who has been a consultant on cross-cultural communica-

tion and member of the National Bahai Race Unity Committee, several workshops will focus on methods for eliminating racism in America. Mrs. Radpour has also been a member of the Chitanonoga, Tenn. Human Rights and Human Relations Committee.

The Saturday night program will be a music and drama presentation by the South Carolina Youth Work-

shop. The Sunday program will develop the concept of the oneness of humanity as the fundamental solution to racism.

The public is invited to participate. Participants are also expected from North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia and Virginia.

# Mutual Adds New Directors

The stockholders, at the first Annual Stockholders Meeting held January 11, elected William V. Bell to serve a three year term as a member of the Board of Directors. Prior to his election, Bell was appointed by the Board of Directors at its November 1993 meeting to fill the unexpired term of Director Wallace O. Green, whose term would expire at the 1994 Annual Meeting. Bell has been employed by IBM Corporation, Research Triangle Park, North Carolina since 1968. He currently serves as Senior Engineer. Bell has served as Chairman of the Durham Board of County Commissioners since 1982.

Mrs. Frye served as Special Assistant to the President and Director of Planned Giving for Bennett College, Greensboro, from October 1989-June 1992. From 1977-1987,

she served as Assistant Vice President for Development, Assistant Executive Director, University Foundation for Carolina A&T State University. She is a member of the North Carolina Museum of History Association, the North Carolina Supreme Historical Society, the Black People for the American West, North Carolina Capital Foundation, the Executive Committee, Greensboro City Club and Joseph McKinley Bryan Foundation. She has served as a member of the Advisory Committee, Bank's office in Greensboro, North Carolina.

## Mutual Annual Stockholders Meeting

The Annual Meeting of Stockholders of Mutual Community Bank, Inc., SSB was held January 11, in the lobby of the bank, Chapel Hill Street.

The meeting was called to order by F. V. Allison, Jr., chairman of the Board and president of the bank, who acted as chairman of the Meeting.

The items of business considered at the Annual Meeting were: election of Directors Meredythe J. Holmes and William V. Bell to serve for terms of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. The next item of business considered was the ratification of Deloitte & Touche as the Bank's auditors for the year ending September 30, 1994. The next item of business was the approval of the Mutual Community Savings Bank, Inc., SSB 1992 Stock Option Plan. The last item on the agenda was the approval of the Mutual Community Savings Bank, Inc., SSB Merit Recognition Plan.

F. V. Allison, Jr. emphasized the continued success of the bank since its inception in 1921 to the present. "Mutual Building and Loan Association Mutual Community Savings Bank, continues to make 1994" stated Allison in his opening remarks to stockholders. "The sale of 355,380 shares of common stock will enable the Bank to more aggressively approach in expanding our services to include loans and to look at the possibility of offering real-estate based loans on a limited basis." The Bank expects to launch a massive marketing program, not only to promote savings, investment checking accounts, but also to promote present and new loan products that will include FHA and VA loans.

George K. Quick, executive vice president and chief operating officer, acknowledged the strength which the savings bank exhibited in 1993. "1993 was a very challenging year—nine months of the corporation operated as a mutual and three months as a stock corporation." Mr. Quick stated that net interest income grew by 8.3% to \$2.1 million with an increase of 36.6% in non-interest income to \$295,000. "The move to the present location was primarily responsible for the increase in general and administrative expenses, however, once it is fully leased, the building will be a positive factor on earnings." "The combination of all these factors resulted in earnings after taxes of \$298,000, a 45% increase over fiscal year 1992. "From a balance sheet standpoint, our company continues to be very strong even though capital continues to have a decline in loan volume. Our capital ratio (required 4%) is approximately at the same level prior to the American Federal Savings and Loan Association in 1990. Closing comments indicated "that this corporation is now poised for the future through its corporate structure, stock, reduced debt and excellent capital base."

Director Bert Collins presented a plaque and resolution naming Director Ralph A. Hunt Director Emeritus. Hunt served as a member of the Board of Directors since 1977 and as a member of the Executive Committees since 1989. Director Hunt resigned from the Board of Directors effective August 19, 1993.

Director Erloy Lewis presented a plaque and resolution naming Director Wallace O. Green Director Emeritus. Green served as a member of the Board of Directors since 1989 in addition to serving as a member of the Marketing Committee since 1990. Green resigned from the Board of Directors July 12, 1993.

Allison thanked his staff, Board of Directors, Stockholders and the community for an outstanding performance during 1993.
