> Every cotton-growing community should be interested in the production of good cotton of uniform quality. This may be done by adopting one good variety for the community and selecting seed from it each year. This plan has al ready proven advantageous to many cotton growers, as cotton of uniform length of fiber and quality may be marketed much more successfully than where there is a mixed lot placed on the market.

To get the best variety for any community is an easy matter.
