Saturday, April 20.

My Dear Mother:-

Although we are about 36 hours short of our destination I write to tell you that the trip has been wonderfully pleasant. We are now right in the heart of the war zone, have seen no sign of any submarines We are being convoyed a by number of tiny chasers, which run about 30 or 40 miles per hour, so we feel comparatively safe.

(Four days later.) We have arrived safely mother. Such a wonderful, wonderful looking country. There lots and lots of things I should like to tell you about the country, myself, the trip, etc., but I shall be compelled to wait until a later date Then too, it would not be fair for me to tell you everything since I do my own censoring. I can't even tell you where I am, but you can make one guess and you hit it correctly "Parlez Vous Français?" We have had a great trip mother, moving pictures concerts, daily newspapers and etc. The weather is realy cold. I had nosidea it would be as it is, however I brought plenty of blankets with me also other equipment neccessary and am comfortable.
