HAS MADE INVESTIGATION

Advises Coal Consumers to Apply to Local Dealer Early and to Secure Supply of Wood

Washington, N.C., Aug. 12, 1918, Editor, Hertford County Herald:

I have been investigating the coal situation with particular reference to household consumption. Have they arranged to secure their supply for the winter? If not, every family should get busy.

Each county has, or should have a fuel administrator, who serves under the State Fuel Administrator, Mr. R. C. Northfleet, of Winston-Salem. Several county agents whom I happen to know are active and earnestestly striving to secure coal for their respective counties.

Ordinarily it "would appear wiser for house-holders to apply to the local coal dealer who usually supplies them with coal. The latter is probably co-operating with the County Fuel Administrator.

No Pennsylvania anthracite coal may be shipped into North Carolins. We can only secure bituminons and what is known as Virginia anthracite, from the coal mines of Virginia, W. Virginia and Tennes-

Now as to the special point in this letter. I fear our local dealers and householders may not be able to secure an ample supply for the winter. The longer delay, the greater danger. Active efforts should be renewed and the consumer should be prepared to pay

Again I earnestly advise every family to arrange for a supply ot wood, either to use as a substitute for coal or for partial use. Cooperative efforts in securing wood may be advisable. The family which waits until November or December to secure their fuel, especially if we jected to serious inconvenience, if
