BOTH BILLS HAVE PASSED IN STATE LEGISLATURE

Call Election to Decide on One Hundred Thousand, Water, Sewerage and Streets.

MOST PRESSING IS THE WATER AND SEWERAGE

Is Expected That Commissioners Will Meet at Early Date and Make Preparations.

The two bills published in the Herald two weeks ago, giving the Town Council authority to call special election in order to allow the voters of the town to decide on bond issues for Water, and Streets, respectively, have successfully passed both branches of the State Legislature and have been duly ratified. This information was conveyed to this office Wednesday by a telegram from Hertford county's representative at Raleigh. The bills as passed by the General Assembly are the originals as published in this paper.

They provide that the town council may, after duly giving notice, hold an election for the purpose of deciding on a fifty thousand dollar bond issue, first, for water and sewerage; and another bill granting them the right to call an election to decide on the issuance of a fifty thousand dollar issue for improvement of the city streets. The two bills are so drawn that the total of one hundred thousand dollars in both bills can be used for either of the propositions, providing funds are available from the other.

It is recognized that the most pressing matter just at this time is the bond issue for water and sewerage; and in all probability, this measure will be the first to be voted upon by the citizens of the town. There is a strong sentiment here for early action on this matter, and the commissioners are expected to meet at some early date and make preparations necessary for an early decision. If practicable, the election will be held before the regular May election, when the town council will be elected and three graded school trustees will also be elected. There will be "fun a plenty" at the May election.

According to the telegram received here the extension bill has also been ratified and is now in full force and effect as appears on page one of this issue.
