NORFOLK'S AUTO SHOW WILL BE A BIG EVENT

The first automobile show to be held in this section in years will occupy the "Billy" Sunday tabernacle, in the city of Norfolk, during the week of April 12. Marked enthusiasm among dealers, as well as among the owners of pleasure cars and trucks, has developed since the announcement that the show will be a reality. From the indications it is expected that the show will be the best point display, number of cars and number of new makes on display that has been held outside the largest cities.

The advertising campaign that has been started in the interest of the show includes a number of novel ideas and every section of the country contiguous to Norfolk will be covered. Already a number of cities in this section have reported that those interested are planning excursions to Norfolk on certain days of the week to see the show and to visit the tabernacle.

Local dealers have been apprized by their principals that auto show week will be utilized by Norfolk dealers to hold a series of meetings at which time plans for the season will be discussed and plans of action developed for the out-of-town dealers. Factories have promised to send men to the show to aid in making the initial exhibit a marked success.

A twelve-piece orchestra has been secured to give concerts at stated intervals and a number of high class entertainers have been secured from New York City.

First Annual Convention of the American Cotton Association

Raleigh, April 1.—Indications are that a majority of North Carolina men and women named as delegates to the First Annual Convention of the American Cotton Association, who had expected to go to the meeting scheduled for March, will make their arrangements to go to the April 13—16th meeting. Postponement of the March meeting was necessary because the Alabama State Board of Health did not think that the influenza situation had sufficiently cleared in March to make it safe for a large number of people to gather together.

The North Carolina officials of the Cotton Association are making an urgent appeal to all delegates named for the March meeting to so shape their business affairs that they will be able to go to the April meeting. A large number of responses were sent to the office of Secretary-Treasurer S. G. Rubinow, in Raleigh saying that 166 delegates were going to the Montgomery meeting.

Reports from Montgomery say that although the meeting will not be held until middle of April, reservations are already being made in the Montgomery hotels and there is every reason to believe that the April meeting will be even more largely attended than the March meeting would have been. In a recent issue of the Montgomery Journal there appeared the pictures of a number of fleeing workers in the Cotton Association movement, and it is interesting to note that six of the eight pictures printed were the pictures of North Carolina people. President and Vice-President L. S. Tomlinson and Frank Gough, Dr. B. W. Kilgore, Dr. Clarence Poe, Commissioner W. A. Graham and Secretary Treasurer S. G. Rubinow were included in the picture.

The program committee is putting the finishing touches on the program for the meeting. Some of the biggest men in the financial and agricultural work of the United States have been secured for this program. They will discuss matters of vital interest and importance to the cotton growers. In addition to the members of the Cotton Association attending the meeting, there will be representatives of spinners of both this and foreign countries at Montgomery.—Jule B. Warren, Publicity Director.
