

**Patent Medicine Widely Advertised
Branded a Fake by Board**

(By N. C. State Board of Health)
Raleigh, June 22.—With photographs showing the different stages of gain in weight the advertisement of the Addiline Company, No. 32 Arcade Building, Columbus, Ohio, tells the story of J. H. Miller, Ohio druggist, who began experimenting on himself and discovered the home treatment known as "Addiline". According to the advertisement it was not until the physicians said it was impossible for him to survive the ravages of tuberculosis that Miller plunged into the depths of research. He emerged from this deep study in a short while with a concoction composed of kerosene in large proportions with a smaller amount of turpentine. The only other ingredient being a small amount of aromatic oil.

It is absolutely preposterous to suggest that a remedy of this kind can be of any benefit in the treatment of tuberculosis. In fact, it is the Bureau of Tuberculosis of the North Carolina State Board of Health, that the effect, if taken internally, may be decidedly dangerous. Used externally it would be of no more value than ordinary turpentine and could be purchased at the drug store for 35 cents whereas the Addiline Company charge \$5.50 for it.

So sanguine and ever-expectant of cure are the victims of tuberculosis that any treatment whatever acts with strong suggestive force upon them for a time. For this reason it is the duty of the press, and every other medium of public information, to protect the people from exploitations of this kind. In fact few publications will accept advertising of this type as they fully realize that advertising of this kind is confidence-destroying. Tuberculosis is curable and better still it is preventable. But the only known cure for tuberculosis at this time is Rest, Fresh Air and Nourishing Food, the greatest of these being Rest. A competent physician is indispensable.

**PUREBRED PIGS ARE
HIGHLY PROFITABLE**

Virginia Farmer Gives His Experience With Scrubs.

Used to Raise Scrubs, but Made Very Little Money—Purebreds Go to Market Much Earlier While Prices Are High.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

How a Virginia farmer marketed pigs heavier and more profitable than he had raised in the past is told in a circular, "Better Sires for Virginia," recently issued by the extension division of the Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical college.

"I used to raise scrub pigs," the farmer declares. "I didn't think there was much money in the hog business because I didn't make much. Since using purebred sires I have changed my mind. As a result of using purebred sires my pigs weighed 215 pounds

last fall, when the average scrub pig would hardly weigh 150 pounds. Consequently my pigs went to market early, while prices were high, while the man with scrub pigs had to keep his longer and feed them high-priced grain while prices kept going down."

The account is accompanied by a picture of purebred boars which are described as having "a good father, a good mother, and no poor relations."

IMMUTABLE BREEDING LAWS

Use of Good Sires, Care, and Management Are Essential in Building Up Herds.

There is no disputing the absolute fact that the laws of breeding are just as immutable as they have ever been. The use of good sires is necessary in breeding up good herds and this alone will not do; good care, feed and management must be given calves, heifers and cows and where these rules are followed, men usually succeed and prosper with greater certainty than thought they depend too largely upon the cooperation of the butcher.

PUREBRED

A purebred animal is one of pure breeding representing a definite, recognized breed and both of whose parents were purebred animals of the same breed. To be considered purebred, live stock must be either registered, eligible to registration, or (in the absence of public registry for that class) have such lineage that its pure breeding can be definitely proved. To be of good type and quality, the animal must be healthy, vigorous, and a creditable specimen of its breed.

MANURE ON CONCRETE FLOOR

That From Steer Valued at \$24.85, While on Earth Floor It is \$4.51 Less.

The manure produced by a 1,000 pound steer in six months on a concrete floor has a value of \$24.85, while on the earth floor the manure is worth only \$20.34, a difference of \$4.51 in favor of concrete. In eight months' time this saving is sufficient to pay the animal's share of the cost of a concrete floor. All further saving is clear profit, which amounts to \$9 a year for a 1,000 pound steer.

CONTROL OF WEEDS IN CORN

Good Harrowing at Proper Time is Most Effective Way of Checking Growth of Plants.

A good harrowing at the proper time is often the cheapest and most efficient way of controlling weeds during the first stages of growth of the corn. The harrow or the weeder also can be used to advantage in breaking up a crust caused by a heavy, dashing rain.

PLANT SOY BEANS ANY TIME

For Hay, Pasture, Green Manure or Soiling Crop Sow Any Time Up to August 1.

Soy beans may be planted any time from early spring until midsummer. For a grain crop they should be planted early, but for a hay, pasture, green manure or soiling crop they may be planted as late as August 1. The choice of a variety must be made by the farmer himself.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$30,000 SEWER SYSTEM BONDS OF THE TOWN OF AHSOKIE, NORTH CAROLINA

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Ahsokie, North Carolina.

Sec. 1. That in pursuance of the provisions of The Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 138 of the Public Laws of 1917 of North Carolina, as amended), negotiable bonds of the Town of Ahsokie, to be known as Sewer System Bonds, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS, for necessary expenses of said Town, to-wit: for the purpose of paying for the construction of a Sewer System for furnishing sewerage to the Town of Ahsokie and its citizens.

Sec. 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds hereby authorized shall be annually levied and collected.

Sec. 3. The following matters are hereby determined and declared pursuant to the requirements of Section 17 of the Municipal Finance Act.

(a) A statement of the debt of the Town of Ahsokie has been made and filed with the Town Clerk pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act and is open to public inspection.

(b) The average assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the Town of Ahsokie for the three fiscal years in which taxes were last levied, as shown by said statement, is \$520,430.

(c) The amount of the net debt of the Town of Ahsokie outstanding, authorized, or to be authorized, as shown by said statement is \$30,000.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be published once in each of four successive weeks after its final passage, as required by the Municipal Finance Act.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless in the meantime, a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under The Municipal Finance Act, and in such event it shall have the effect when approved by the voters of the Town of Ahsokie at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 7th day of June, 1920, and was first published on the 11th day of June, 1920.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

Only those growers, who hold common stock in the Exchange, can sell their peanuts through it.
The Board of twenty-one Directors, which will control the management of the Exchange, will be elected by the growers from their respective districts.

—PROVISION FOR PREFERRED STOCK—

Preferred Stock is issue in five classes and pays 8 per cent dividend.
Preferred Stock has no voting power and can be held by anyone. The grower, who owns a share of Common Stock does not have to buy Preferred Stock.
Payment of interest guaranteed out of operating expenses.
Beginning the third year one class of Preferred Stock will be retired each year, until all the Preferred Stock is retired, which will be at the end of the 7th year.

—MARKETING AGREEMENT—

Each grower agrees to market his peanuts through the Exchange for a period of seven years, beginning in 1920, if arrangements are perfected in time for handling this year's crop. If such arrangements are not perfected in time for this year's crop, then beginning with 1921 crop.
The Exchange agrees to buy all the peanuts of each grower member as soon as ready for market, as per marketing agreement.
Each grower on delivery of his peanuts to the Exchange through its agent at his nearest railroad freight station would receive an advance price on his peanuts and the balance then be paid out as the peanuts of that crop are sold.
The contract is not binding on the grower, if he stops growing the peanuts, or in case of death.
