

Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Hertford County

The Board of County Commissioners of Hertford County met on the 8th day of February, 1922, at the courthouse door in Winton, North Carolina; present, J. C. Taylor, E. W. Whitley, E. H. Eure, J. M. Eley, the Chairman, F. G. Tayloe; J. O. Askew, Jr., being absent.

Proceedings of the last meeting were read and approved.

The committee on Parker's ferry flat and float report work done and committee is discharged.

The committee on the waterworks at the jail reports same completed and the committee is discharged.

F. G. Tayloe as a committee to move houses at county home is continued.

J. C. Taylor as a committee to investigate repairs necessary to courthouse at Maneys Neck township, made report, and he is continued with the authority to make all necessary repairs as cheaply as possible and report to the Board.

E. H. Eure as a committee to arrange office for the Home Demonstrator in Courthouse continued.

M. W. Whitley as a committee to have boat built for Hill's ferry is continued.

The Board votes to grant ten more days to the Bank of Winton, Treasurer to complete its additional bond required by them, and to deliver same to W. D. Boone and J. A. Northcott same to be subject to approval of the Board at its next meeting.

The committee appointed to investigate the tax list of Norman Hall made report, and the Board orders that the sum of one hundred dollars be allowed as reduction on list for house burned and that the list be changed to add two hundred dollars for improvements made on buildings in his home tracts.

Mr. E. H. Eure makes report that the report of the Clerk of Superior Court has been checked and found correct and the committee is discharged thereupon.

On motion and carried the Board votes to make the proposition to O. H. Lewis and to instruct the county attorney to collect the sum of five dollars per month form the said Lewis until the sum of one hundred and twenty eight dollars has been reimbursed to the county for the amount paid A. C. Vann for sheep killed by Lewis's dogs.

The Clerk is instructed to send the statement of account for hire of prisoners to Mr. E. C. Bridger.

The county attorney made statement to the Board that Mr. Jno. E. Vann, administrator, agrees that report will be made on Carter's estate by the next meeting of the Board.

The Board instructs the Clerk to investigate several tracts of land reported unlisted and to have same put on the tax list for taxation.

Upon motion and carried, the Board votes to allow a reduction of \$250 on lot in Winton listed to J. Wilson Parker, making same read \$750.

The Board orders the clerk to notify the jury that investigated the killing of sheep of R. A. Holloman, that the name of Hurdle reported as owning the dogs, was in error as Hurdle proved that he owned no dogs, and that they be requested to investigate further, and endeavor to ascertain the correct owner of the dogs.

W. L. Earley reports to the Board that he intended to list 35 heads of sheep for 1921, in Maneys Neck township, and requested that they be listed and the Board orders that the taxes be computed on same at a valuation of \$3.50 each, and he was reimbursed for the three killed, at that price.

The Board instructed the Clerk to make statement of amount due by the Road Commission to the Board of County Commissioners, and to present same at the next meeting of the Board of Road Commissioners and request that the amount be paid.

The Board, upon motion and carried, orders that contract be entered into with the State Board of Health for anti-typhoid and diphtheria treatment for the coming season, the county to pay to the state the sum of eight and one-third cents for each dose administered; Treatment to be free to the people of the county.
