 During her life at the Sanatorium Mrs. McBrayer gave a considerable part of her time in planning and executing various forms of entertainments for the patients. 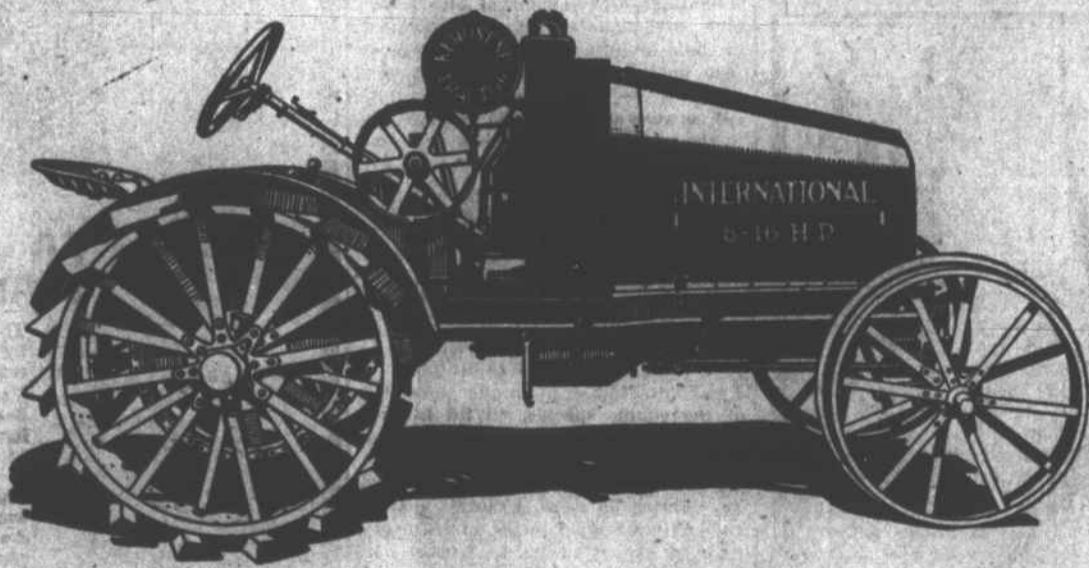
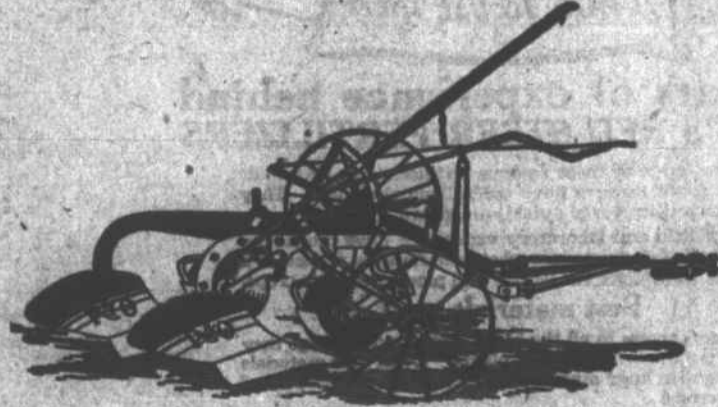
