

ByRhe use of special machinery de algued at the Forest Products labora-tory, boxes can be artificially subjected to the same kind of shocks and strains they receive in actual transport. From these tests it has been possible to determine the correct amount and quality of material to use, the result of defects in the wood, the adaptability of different species of wood, and the best types of box and crate construction.

The results of these investigations have recently been compiled by the Forest Service and published in book form under a co-operative arranges with the National Association of Box Manufacturers.

In addition the book includes the standardised specifications for boxmaking tentatively adopted by the American Society for Testing Materials, and also a key to the identifica-tion of the chief wood species used in the construction of boxes and crates. It can be obtained from the Secretary of the National Association of Box Manufacturers, Conway Bldg. Chicago.

APPROVE HIGHWAY PROJECTS

Funds Aggregating \$10,389,518.58 Al-lotted Toward Construction of Public Roads.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agricultura.) Construction of public roads con-tinuer rapidly. During the first quarter of the current fiscal year, or the three months ending September 30, highway projects in 38 states were ap-proved and federal aid funds aggregat-ing \$10,389,516.58 were allotted toward their construction by the bureau of public roads, United States Department of Agriculture. Additional proaideration.

The length of the projects approved during the three months is 1,400 miles, exclusive of a number of important bridges which, when constructed, will measure slightly more than two miles in length, all told. Total cost of the approved projects is estimated at \$25, 353,848.39; total cost of the bridges at \$1,478,146.77, bringing the grand total up to \$26,881,994.72. Of this sum the states will pay about \$16,500,000, or more than three-fifths of the total.

Up to the beginning of the current fiscal year the department has approved projects totaling 35,402 miles in ength, costing approximately \$587,-321,323. Of the total cost of construction federal-aid funds had been allotted to the extent of \$202,764,414. The foregoing figures cover mileage and cost of all roads approved by the department since the inception of federal aid. Considering the allotments since the beginning of the current fiscal year, the department has approved, from the inception of federal aid to September 30 last, roads totaling 36,802 miles in length and costing \$614,-153,318. Toward their construction the federal government has allotted a grand total of \$213,153,931, or more than 34 per cent.

Projects approved during the three months ending September 30 are lo-cated in Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mich-Minnesota. Mississippi, Mis-

shire, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Okiahoma, Oregon Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

Most of the mileage thus approved embraces graded earth, sand-clay and gravel roads. Of those types of roadway, the department approved projects totaling 1,044.7 miles. The cost of constructing these roads, comparatively small, will total \$10,949,286,17 it is estimated, and of that sum a total of \$4,383,995.62 has been allotted from federal-aid funds

Various kinds of macadam roads, bituminous macadam predominating, total 90.45 miles in length. Construction of these roads will cost approxi-mately \$2,944,771.56, and of this sum federal-aid funds to the extent of

\$1,281,920.16 will be available under the department's approval.

Roads of the highest type to be con-structed of concrete, bituminous con-crete, brick and block, total 264.75 miles in length, and are estimated to cost \$11,459,790.66. Toward their construction the government has allotted from federal-aid funds \$4.012.646.35. The total estimated cost of the various bridges to be built incidental to construction of the highways is placed at \$1,478,146.77, of which federal-sid funds of \$710.954.45 are available.

To Undertake Survey.

The bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture will shortly undertake a survey of the mileage, cost, character of construction and general condition of the highways throughout the country.

Build Roads for People. In deciding on the kind and quality of roads to be built, it would be well for the state authorities to keep in mind the fact that the roads are to be built for the people and not merely for the contractors.

Vehicles Distributed. The Department of Agriculture has distributed practically all the surplise motor vehicles controlled by the Wardepartment for road building purposes in various states. The list includes 21,124 trucks and 8,299 automobiles.
