AMERICAN LEGION COMMUNITY DAY

The American Legion Community Day, which will be held in the City of Suffolk, on May 17th, bids fair to be one of the most delightful and auspicious occasions which has ever been held in Tidewater Virginia.

The festivities of the day will open at 12 o'clock by a big parade. In the line of march will be the Suffolk military company, the American Legion, the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion, school children of the City of Suffolk, a number of attractive floats, and many other people and things of interest.

The parade will be followed by the tournament, which will be held at the grounds of the Four County Fair, at 2 o'clock, at which time Governor E. Lee Trinkle will deliver the charge to the knights, and the distinguished guests will include Lieut. Governor and Mrs. J. E. West, State Comander of the American Legion and Mrs. E. E. Goodwyn, Congressman and Mrs. J. T. Deal, Speaker of the House and Mrs. R. L. Brewer, Jr., General and Mrs. C. C. Vaughan, Miss Cora Vaughan, City Manager of Norfolk and Mrs. C. E. Ashburner, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion and Mr. W. W. Townes, and other notables.

Any knight desiring to enter the tournament list can do so by paying a fee of \$5.00 and applying to Mr. John M. Berkeley, Chairman of the Tournament Committee, while the admission to the tournament itself will be only 50 cents.

The tournament will be followed by a grand coronation ball, to be held at eight o'clock, at the Armory Hall, at which the queen chosen by the winning knight will be crowned. The ball will be opened by a grand march, which will be led by Governor and Mrs. E. Lee Trinkle, followed by Dr. Whitney F. Godwin, Master of Ceremonies and his pages, with the orator of the evening, the queen of the tournament and winning knight, the maids and other participating knights, Lieut. Gov. and Mrs. West, Col and Mrs. E. E. Goodwyn, Congressman and Mrs. J. T. Deal, General and Mrs. C. C. Vaughan, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Townes, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Ashburner, and the Court Ladies and Gentlemen. After the grand march, the coronation address will be delivered, and the queen will be crowned, after which the royal figure, the quadrille and the Virginia reel will be danced. Then the dance will be opened to all those desiring to participate.

The fee for admission at the tournament hall will be \$2.00 for gentlemen and the fee for ladies will be \$1.00, all of which funds will be donated by the American Legion for the purpose of erecting a memorial library in memory of the soldiers from Nansemond County and the city of Suffolk, who made the supreme sacrifice in the late war.
