WATERS NORMAL WILL GET APPROPRIATION

According to information gathered at Winton last Monday, the County Board of Education has accepted the proposal of the Waters Normal Institute, colored, to relinquish control to the county and state, the latter to convert it into a county high school and teacher training school for Hertford County negroes. An appropriation has been made to the school at Winton and it will become county property.

Ahooskie colored educators and individuals of that race are now making strong efforts to vote upon themselves a special school tax for the purpose of continuing their school here. At present, they have little or no support other than by private subscriptions. The State and county have supported it to some extent, but these appropriations will be partly lapsed on account of the action of the board in taking over the Winton school.
