(Continued from page 1) orders were doing things which no other agency could or ever would do.

He believed that God had selected this Nation as the final place of abode for those to whom He intended to embody the perfection of earthly man—man whom he made in His own image. The very fact that the founders of this country came here seeking freedom of worship and liberty of conscience and the other principles set forth in the Constitution, he believed were evidences that this Nation was set apart from all others for man to attain the heights for which God made him.

He declared himself an optimist although not of the kind to always look for something good without trying to help bring to pass. He also paid his respects to the person or persons who thought the world was all out of joint. "This is a good world; if you don't believe it, try to make one yourself," he said. "God knows; leave it to Him," was his concluding statement.

A bounteous dinner was served in the class rooms, following the benediction by Rev. J. J. Barker. The afternoon session began at half past two o'clock, with Mr. W. B. Strickland, Jr., of Scotland Neck, president of the district convention presiding.

Business was despatched within an hour and a half, and at 4:30 the delegates left the meeting place to look about the town, which had dressed itself up for the occasion.

Strong resolutions of thanks were unanimously passed by the convention, thanking the local Magnolia Camp No. 328 for the spread given them, and thanking Ahoskie for its entertainment.

John H. Hall, of Aulander, was elected president of the next convention body; and Aulander was chosen as the next convention town. The W. O. W. district convention will be held there, Thursday, April 19, 1924.

Ahoskie Mayor Is Now Married Man

Mr. Luther C. Williams, mayor of Ahoskie, was married, Saturday, August 17, to Miss Hettie Hargrave, of Wakefield, Va. The ceremony took place in the Monticello Hotel at Norfolk at six o'clock that evening. Mr. and Mrs. Williams left immediately after the wedding for Washington, and other northern points.

They will soon return to Ahoskie, and will make their home temporarily in the Manhattan Hotel.

Mrs. Williams taught school in Ahoskie during the session of 1922-1923, and already has made many friends here, all of whom are glad to welcome her return here as one of their number.

Mayor Williams, a native of Alamance County, came to Ahoskie several years ago, after completing his education at Wake Forest College and the University of North Carolina. He was superintendent of the local school his first year here, after which he became associated with attorney W. W. Rogers in the practice of law. He later opened a law office here and has practiced independently since that time.

He served in the World War, being one of the first men of the town and county to volunteer his services. At that time he was mayor of the town, and he now holds the same office. Since his return from the military service he has held this office by appointment, and is now serving his second elective term. He has also taken a leading part in educational affairs of the town and community as well as being a worker in the church.

The marriage of this popular couple gives Ahoskie a unique place among small towns of the State and for that matter the whole country, in the record of marriages that have drawn upon the school faculty for the brides. Of the nine single lady teachers who were members of the 1922-23 faculty, five have wedded since the close of the school year.

All have married local men except one.
