purchase a road outfit from the Benjamin Machinery Company. The outfit consists of a large caterpillar tractor, road maintainer, drag and scarefow. It is the same outfit two or three of the commissioners saw working at Elizabeth City and in Perquimans county last week, and is a young brother to the outfit which has been at work on the Aulander- Winton State highway.

Dr. Pollard of Winton made the motion to buy, under the plan alvanced by the company's representative two weeks ago; that is, to take the sale price of eight mules from one township as a cash consideration and the balance to be paid monthly over a period of twelve months. The outfit would then become the property of the township selling the mules. A second to such a motion was not forthcoming-the other members balked, probably feeling that Winton township would get a plum into which they might want to bite. A discussion ensued, in which the weight of opinion favored the purchase of the outfit, to be used in every township, and her parents. retain the mules until cold weather came and a better market could be found for them, and also allow time for a thorough test of the machinery. A second to the motion under

the conditions named in the preceding paragraph was made and after fifteen minutes more of discussion, a vote was taken. It was a weak vote and another discussion was in order. Another vote was called for, and, one by one, they voted to purchase, at an approximate cost of \$6,800. A cash payment was made and the balance divided into payments, due in six and twelve months, respectively.

K. H. Barrow, bridge contractor and builder, was paid in full for a bridge completed in St. Johns township; and was required to give bond in accordance with the provisions of a State law, overlooked by the board when it made the contracts. The Stoney Creek bridge foundation is still unacceptable by the board and by Mr. Barrow alike. The cement has not "set", and the work will have to be gone over again. The contractor and the cement dealers are now seeking to settle the question of liability, and it is possible litigation may result over the quality of the cement used.

The board voted that no commissioner could hire extra mules for any road work without the consent of the whole board. Commissioner Snipes voted negatively, and said as explanation that he had been working nine extra mules since crops were laid by. He thought the other commissioners would do well to double up during August and September and thus get in some good licks before the fall weather came.

A mass of bills were approved by the board, and payrolls were okehed. It was six o'clock before the meeting adjourned, and it had been an interesting one for the non-performer.
