According to the records of postmaster Willoughby, the receipts from sales of postage stamps at the local office for the third quarter of 1923, ending on September 30, showed a gain of approximately 11 percent above the same quarter of 1922. The total sales were as follows: 3rd quarter, 1922, \$1,857.25; 3rd quarter, 1923, \$2,075.70. This is a net gain of \$218.45.

It is practically assured that this office will become a Second Class office during 1924. The sales of stamps for this year will exceed the minimum amount required by the department for a Second Class office.
