

There was a waiting line at the bank windows mc.-t all day long; and those waiting did

not leave all the money in the bank many of them taking the cash off with them, to "salt" it away or to pay off existing debts.

In fact, so gr at was the increase that it was actually necessary for the bank officers to install a brand new filing system for deposit slips. The old one would not hold them. Even _that never happened in 1919, when we were all young Henry Fords.




