

Co-operative tobacco growers will are in a third payment amounting to three million dollars in Ea North Carolina and the old belt of North Caroling and Virginia in December according to an announce-ment made by the directors November 26th.

Shingle roofs and defective fines still lead in the cause of fires in North Carolina though the toll from this and all other causes in the month of October just passed was hardly half of the total for the month of October, 1922. The October fire loss this year was \$325,000 and last October it was \$740,329 according to the re-port made by Stacy W. Wade, Insur-ance Commissioner.

The Seventh District Convention of Odd Fellows adjourned in Fayetteville Tuesday night until April 1924 when the meeting will be held in Lumberton.

The general average on the Oxford tobacco market every day last week was above \$25. per hundred and on Friday the average for all sold was \$26.05. The break amounting to 161,000 pounds.

Tobacco sales upon the Wilcon market opened strong this week. The first day's sales amounted to 1,004,-806 pounds which sold for \$263,737.-76 an average of \$26.24.
