Trader obtained license to practice law under a strange statute enacted by the "Carpet-bag" Legislature of 1868-69, which permitted any one to secure license by paying a license tax of \$20 (laws 1868-69, ch. 46).

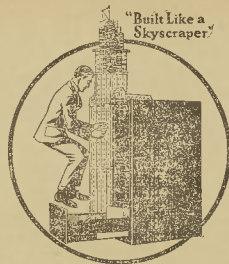
