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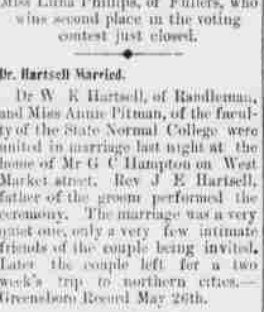
Why Not Commencement.

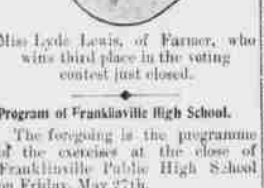
The outlook for the next term is very promising. Fall term begins August 8th.
