TWENTY-THREE YEARS IN PENSION OFFICE.

Guilford County Man Retires from Service of Uncle Sam to Enter Private Business Career.

Levi E. Johnson, of Guilford county, N. C., who has for twenty-three years held a position in the pension bureau at Washington tendered his resignation to enter business there. Mr. Johnson, who was chief of a division, held a \$1,000 position. So well was he liked that he was presented with a gold headed cane by his associates when he retired to-day. Mr. Johnson, who is well along in life, has held an interesting career. In 1867 he held a commission under General Canby authorizing him to administer the oath of allegiance to North Carolinians. He later was elected clerk of the superior court and judge of the probate court, which positions he held for six years. He subsequently held positions of importance in the internal revenue service until appointed to the pension bureau in 1883. He now retires from the government service to manage an electric supply and construction company, and to oversee valuable real estate which he possessed before entering the government service in Washington. Mr. Johnson lived at Lexington for a number of years.

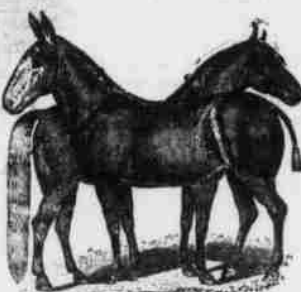
