SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

Interesting Meeting Held at M. P. Church in Asheboro Sunday Morning.

The Asheboro Township Sunday School association met in the M. P. Church Sunday morning with a large attendance. E. Moffitt presided, and Mrs. W. J. Moore acted as secretary.

The convention opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. N. R. Richardson, who spoke on, "How The Church May Become Vitrally Interested in Sunday School Work."

Following Mr. Richardson, a plain practical talk on personal work by Dr. C. C. Hubbard, of Worthville, was listened to with much interest by the large gathering of Sunday School workers.

A canvass of the schools in the township showed that there were delegates from all but one.

The subject of county and township pledges was discussed and the convention obligated itself to raise \$40.00 for the county and state work. This amount will be raised by the schools, each raising its pro rata according to the number of members enrolled. A collection was also taken to defray the expenses of the township work.

The annual election of officers resulted as follows: President—E. Moffitt. Vice President—H. M. Robbins. Secretary and Treasurer—Miss Ella Hendricks.

The election of delegates to the County Convention which meets at Franklinville July 19 and 20 was then taken up. B. A. Yeargin and Mrs. W. H. Moring were declared delegates, with Misses Minnie Hoover and May McAllister as alternates.
