Mr. Stuart writes Urging the Endorsement of Mr. Hammond.

To the Democrats of Randolph Co.: Shall we turn down a faithful public official at the end of his first term—clean and honest public servant?

Is that fair; is it democratic; was it ever done before in the history of our county?

Will you break precedents now? I am for the re-nomination and endorsement of W. C. Hammond for the Clerk of the Superior Court.

I am opposed to one man's holding office too long, I believe in rotation in office, but I do not believe in turning a good official, a good man, and a good Democrat out at the end of his first term, without any reason whatever, except that some one else wants the office.

I have taken pains somewhat to enquire as to the kind of public official Mr. Hammond is, and am fully convinced that he has made one of the best public officials this county has ever had.

Those who are in a position to know speak in the highest terms of him, both personally and as a public official.

Judge Ferguson stated last week from the bench to the grand jury, when they made their report, commending the manner in which Mr. Hammond conducted his office "that there was not a better Clerk in the State than Mr. Hammond."

Judge Ferguson is said to be a very careful and accurate Judge and examines each entry every day in the minutes of the court. Other judges I learn have commended Mr. Hammond for his accuracy and faithfulness and especially for the care in which he invests and manages the public funds.

Mr. Hammond should in my opinion be endorsed for a second term for the following reasons:

First. He is a good officer and a good man.

Second. He attends to the business of the office and gives it his best individual attention. He is always found in his office attending to the duties of the office.

Third. He has no favorites and treats all alike; the poorest man who goes into his office gets the same attention that the wealthy man gets.

Last but not least he is a good Democrat and has grown so steadily in public favor, that in my opinion he can get more votes than any one we can run for Clerk.

The Democratic plan of organization wisely provides that any one in the primaries may demand that a vote be taken on any and all aspirants for office, and I suggest that the people attend the primaries and vote for Mr. Hammond and see that delegates who are not friendly to him are sent to the county convention.

Let us have no playing politics, but let the people say in the primaries who they want for the various county offices. Don't let the politicians run the convention, but let the people go to the primaries and vote their sentiments and all will be well.

Rev. C. A. Wood filled his pulpit in the M. E. Church Sunday morning preaching a powerful sermon.

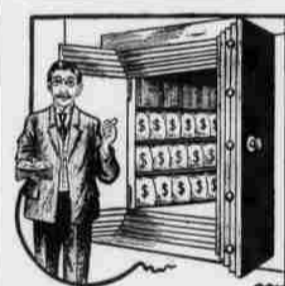
