Lesson 6—Luke 11: 15-21—Aug. 3 1906.

THE GOSPEL FEAST WHO ARE INVITED.

In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying: if any man thirst, let him come unto me and drink. John 7: 37.

I will give unto him that is athirst, of the fountain of the water of life freely. Rev. 21: 6.

Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool. Isa. 1: 18.

Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Matt. 11: 28.

Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money, come ye, buy, and eat: yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Isa. 55: 1.

Look unto me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth: for I am and there is none else. Jer. 17: 13.

All that the Father giveth me shall come to me; and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out. John 6: 37.
