FURTHER TESTIMONY.—The following is an extract
from a letter received from Rev. Mr. William
Garrison, Esq., of Boston:

BOSTON, Vt., Oct. 23d, 1845.

Messrs. SANKEY & CO. have been engaged with
a series of articles, designed by a Committee
of Friends, to be exhibited in Boston, for
the purpose of exciting the public mind to
an interest in the Slave Trade. The
Committee, having been unable to find
any publisher willing to print them, have
been compelled to print them themselves,
and to sell them at a loss. They have
been sold at a loss of \$1000. The
expenses of printing, paper, ink, &c., have
been \$1000. The money raised by the sale
of these articles has been given to the
Committee, and will be used for their
present and future operations.
