

CAMP PAINE, CAMANGO, MEXICO,

M y 20, 1847. We are daily expecting Li. Col. Fagg and his troops, and we shall then proceed at once to join the main body of the Army at Monterey, and will very soon after be sent to Salidlo, whence we hope to form the advance column of attack on San Louin Poibai.

About the 1st instant I forwarded to you a list of the deaths in the Regiment since we left Smithvilles Since then, we have had several deaths, all of which I will furward you at the close of the month. It gives me great pleasure to inform you, that the health of our troops is evidently improving, and our hospital has at least a

third less in it than when I wrote before. Major Stokes, in command of the two Edgecombs, the New Hangver, and the Caswell Companies, has already gone to Corraivo, a pleasant and healthy village about mill way between this and Monterey, where he is appointed to govern until ballance of the Regiment goes up, when he will join us, and the entire Regi-ment will pr ceed together to Gen. Tay-lor's Head Quarters.

Since our troops have been stationed here, they have been required to perform much laborious service, in escorting and guarding trains to and from. Monterey,-They have performed this duty so cheer. fully, and with such alacrity, that Captain Solman, of the Regulars, told me it was decidedly the best and most punctual R-giment over at this place, the Regulars not excepted. This is praise from a high quar ter, and as it is just praise, won by the sweat and toil of our troops, in a service where there could be no other laurels won, I send it to you to be recorded in their fa

vor, and for the gratification it may afford their friends. Col. Payne returned from Monterey on Saturday afternoon, 23d, and had not been in camp more than three or four hours.
