

### The English, Scotch, and Irish.

Nowhere, then, at the popular age of the three kingdoms, (or rather our colonies,) it may easily be perceived that there is a considerable difference amongst them with respect to temperament. "Oho!" exclaims Mr. Patrick, "she looks as if she'll serve our purpose readily as well just as the bony lass to give us two shillings for a shilling, and inquire where's Mr. Thompson's house, and such?" "We're no hungry, and any way we'd save the seller," said the old story of the experiment made in London by two friends, who spoke to every labourer they met between St. Giles's and Holborn Hill, until they had found one belonging to each of the three countries; and to each, but separately, they put the question, "What would you take to stand on the top of the gallows all night with only your neighbours on?" The Englishman, in a straightforward way, replied triumphantly, "For pounds, the Scotch man certainly asked, "What will you give?" and the Irishman, half-hoax, exclaimed, "Sure, I'd be after taking a bad case."
