## Death from the Bite of a Rattlesnake.

A most lamentable affair occurred in New York on Thursday evening, which in a few hours resulted in the dea h of Dr. Arnold F. Wainright, one of the professors in Crosby street Medical College,-The particulars are thus related by one of the New York paperst

The rattlesnake from whose bite Dr. W. died, was received on Thursday from his brother in Alabama. He was bitten at the Broadway House, where he had taken the snake for the purpose of showing it It was let loose upon the bar room floor, where it coiled itself up and commensed a ow hum, and was tensed with a stick and some persons touching it with their feet without showing much consciousness. In returning it to the box Dr. W. seized it with his need hand; instantly the reptile reared his head, threw back his jaws and struck; his fangs entering between the fin gers and fastening on the inside of the ring finger on the right hand.

No remedies seemed to avail, and the imputation of the arm, requested by Dr. W., was deemed inadvisable by those present. Another account says:

The unhappy man seemed to possess his full faculties almost to the last moment, and was perfectly aware of the fate to which he was inevitably hastening. Some fifteen minutes before his decease, turning to a friend who was supporting him, "This is horrible!" said he, as he felt the extreme pain leaving his band, and the sensation of case slowly creeping up the arm from the seat of the wound-"This is horrible! to know that death is gradually feeling his way to my vitals!-that arm is dead alrea. dyl--and --placing the uninjured hand over his heart-- "the destroyer will soon be here!" This acme knowledge of his sure dissolution, which as a medical man he must have possessed, could have been nought else than fearful!

The body, after death, presented the usual appearances of disease from the bite of these hideous reptiles, it being fright fully swollen and mostled.
