3. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.

4. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

7. The United States Courts have also repeatedly decided that a Postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department of the neglect of a person to take from the office, ne vspapers addressed to him, renders the Postmaster liable to the publisher for the subscription price.


