THE BATTLE OF FISHING CREEK.

The Nashville Patriot publishes the following Every one of the peace propositions coming account of the battle of Fishing Creek, derived from Private Morris, of Colonel McNairy's Cav-

It seems that Gens Crittenden and Zollicoffer learned on Saturday last, that the enemy had thrown a force of three thousand men across against agreement with brothers. Dissolution of Fishing Creek, leaving the remainder of his forces on the opposite side. The creek was much swollen by the recent heavy rains, and was difficult to cross. Gen. Crittenden, who was in command, determined to attack and cut off the enemy's advance, if possible, before they were reinforced. He accordingly ordered Gen. Zollicoffer forward with his brigade Saturday night, following himself with the remainder of the army. At 8 o'clock Sunday morning, Gen. Zollicoffer discovered the enemy in large force, estimated at twenty thousand, the whole having succeeded in crossing the creek, and immediately in his front. The engagement was shortly commenced, and, in a short time became general.
