utation of the people, as law-abiding and honest, and of the courts of law as impartial in the administration of justice. The thought which caused me to write that portion of my letter quoted by you, and which is still my opinion, is, that in the condition of things at present existing, the result of war, and not of the free action of the people, the action of the civil courts and grand juries, however honest, would not prevent the recurrence of frequent acts of violence, particularly towards Freedmen, during the time intervening between the complete restoration of civil law. Military law is, I think, a necessity in the transition state in which the States lately hostile to the Government now are. I think you are in error in the opinion to be inferred from that portion of your letter in which you say, "That as in all probability the Commissioners of Freedmen hear only the complaining party." Such action by the officers of the Freedmen's Bureau would be in violation of their instructions. I have myself cautioned the Assistant Commissioners of the necessity of getting at the truth in all cases. There has been no complaint | So all smiles are not joys, but often conceal made of the action of the officers of that Department, and I think that their conduct has been

Permit me, in conclusion, to say, I think there can be no real conflict between the civil and military authorities in the State. This question of difference between us, has come up whilst I have been temporarily in command of the Department, and my action in the matter is founded on what I conceive to be the rights of the case. I have none but feelings of kindness towards the civil officers and people of the State of North Carolina. I am, sir, very resp'ly, your obed't serv't,

Maine Democratic Convention-The President and State Sovereignty .- The Maine Democratic State Convention met in Portland on the 15th. There were present five hundred and seventy-four delegates. Mr. E. F. Pillsoury, of Connecticut. the temporary chairman, in his address said that an attempt is being made to destroy State sov- Indiana. ereignty, which the Democratic party must frustrate He also said that but for President Johnson its destruction would have been accomplished at all hazards. The latter expression was received with great applause. The resolutions adopted were in consonance with the spirit of these remarks.

Mr. Jefferson upon Tories .- A strong argument in President Johnson's favor may be drawn from Mr. Jefferson's reply to a lady who appealed to him in behalf of her son, who was a Virginia Tory during the Revolution. He wrote to her as follows:

"I suppose him to bave taken sides with the British before our declaration of independence; and if this was the case, I respect the candor of the measure, though I do not his wisdom. A right to take the side which every man's conscience approves in a civil contest is too precious a right and too favorable to the preservation of liberty, not to be protected by its well informed friends .- Randall's Life of Jefferson, vol. 1, page 430.

WEALTHY GIRL - Probably the nichest woman in the United States is Miss Hester Robinson, a young and beautiful girl, lately of New Bedford, but now a resident of New York city. Her father died recently, feaving her one million outright and the income during her life of about four millions more.
