emigrant to Brazil writes back concerning Pedro the Second as follows:

"The Emperor was forty years old on the 2d of December last, six feet and a little over in height, stoutly built, easy, graceful and dignified in his movements, has rather an effeminate voice, is affable, courteous and agreeable, easy of access, and particularly partial to Americans and encourages their visits to him, speaking their language fluently. It is customary to salute him by kissing the back of his hand, a custom prevalent among the children in Brazil with their parents in salutation, and which comes quite naturally from seeing such exhibitions in such common and constant occurrence. The Emperor is liberal and progressive in his views, and encourages emigration with full protection in every respect to all creeds and denominations. Though a strict and constant Catholic, he is a wise and far-seeing statesman, and has done and will do nothing to trammel conscience. He is a gentleman in every respect, a worthy potentate, and a true man."
