

THE NEW STAY LAW.

An Act to change the Jurisdiction of the Courts and the Rules of Pleading thereon. Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That all warrants issued by a Justice of the Peace in civil cases, shall not be returnable within twelve months after the execution of the same, before some Justice of Peace for the county.
