FRUIT CROP.

We give below a circular letter from a Philadelphia firm in regard to the fruit trade this season. Prices will not be so large this season as last, but with the large crop that we will probably have, it will prove a great source of income to the country. We advise our people to save every pound of fruit they possibly can:

PHILADELPHIA, June 13th, 1867 .- Trade in "Domestic Dried Fruits," within a few years, has grown to a vast magnitude, and now enters into the business calculations of almost every farmer and merchant in the entire country. Prior to the late war, the South, particularly the States of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Northern Georgia, were the principal sources of supply, of what is termed in the large markets, "Southern fruit." Owing to the general prostration of all business interests through the South, caused by the war, the farmers and producers in almost every Southern State are now turning their attention to the business of drying fruit, as a source of income. For the purpose of informing every one engaged in this business, as to the best method of preparing their fruit for market-to make it most saleable, and to bring the highest prices, the following suggestions are made: First in regard to

PEACHES .- Whether peaches are pealed or unpealed, don't wait for the fruit to become perfectly ripe and mellow, because in this case, they will dry dark in color, and while a ripe peach is intrinsically better than a hard one yet the demand among the buyers is universally for bright colored peaches, whether pared or unpared. And in regard to pared peaches, not only is bright color essential for ready sale at highest prices, but they should be cut as fine as a little care and patience will allow. Instead of cutting a pared peach into halves or quarters, by cutting it into ten or fifteen "quarters," and taking pains in regard to proper ripeness of the fruit it will dry quicker, and be made far more saleable. To draw a comparison between the pare bright and fine cut pared peaches,) with the pared peaches of North Carolina and Tennessee, from which States the pared peaches Georgia pared peaches have brought prices one third higher than has been realized for North Carolina or Tennessee pared peaches. All this Skirts-a beautiful article. can be obviated by care and pains. The rule | A full line of Notions, Hosiery, Gloves, Straw of color will apply to unpared peaches as well Goods, Bonnets and Bonnet Ribbons, French Flowers, as to pared, but is reversed entirely in regard to Hats and Caps, Boots and Shoes, cut. Unpared penches dried in halves, sell much better than when mixed with quarters, and a general stock of Hardware. or when entirely quarters. The difference of price ranges from year to year, an average of fully two cents per pound more for all halves, than for mixed, or quarters. Care should be taken in drying unpared peaches, to select fine large fruit, as the demand always runs for large bright halves. If dried in kilns or ovens, don't let them get burned, and in packing for market let them get thoroughly cool and dry before shipping. Don't mix different qualities in the same package, as it is always discovered, and the sale will be based upon the poorest quality in the barrel or sack.

ABOUT DRIED APPLES -Select good sound fruit-not ripe to mellowness. Pare them clean, take the cores entirely out, and cut in as fine slices as patience and labor will allow. Be very color, and the difference in price obtained over the ordinary rough cut, dark-colored, and not well cored apples, will more than pay for the time and trouble of so doing. You can't make a bright colored dried apple or peach out of mellow ripe fruit, and the bright colored fruit will always out-sell the dark.

BLACKBERRIES-Have become a great staple. They should be thoroughly dried (not burned) before packed for market. If packed too soon they breed worms, become mouldy, and eventually worthless. A good many barrels of last season's crop perished entirely by being packed too green, and a number of these unmerchantable barrels having accidently been shipped to far Northwestern markets, the fact to SELL LOWER than those who profess to sell at of their bad condition has had a prejudicial ef- Cost. feet on Southern blackberries, which great care in drying and packing this year will overcome.
