CHINESE WORSHIP.

The writer of the following letter is a native of North Carolina, but for several years a Missionary in China. We copy from the Raleigh Biblical Recorder:

SHANGHAI, February 1st, 1867. Dear Brother Taylor :- In your last letter, you solicited some communications that might be used through the religious press of the South .-I do not know how I can better subserve the cause of Missions at home, than by writing a series of articles on ancestral worship among the Chinese, or the Chinese idea of death, and what is required for the repose of the spirit of the departed. A detailed account of the practices of the Chinese in connection with the solemnities of death and the future world, will, to the unitiated, throw much light upon the religious condition of a great people, and will, I trust, awaken, in the hearts of many, a lively interest in the China Missions. Ancestral worship is by far the greatest obstacle with which the Christian Missionary has to contend. It has, and naturally so too, a deeper hold upon the affections of the people than all the other systems of worship com-

The Chinese believe in the immortality of the soul, and in future rewards and punishments, till, according to their idea of transmigration of souls, the wheel of fate casts the soul back into the world again, either in the form of man, beast, bird or insect, according to its manner of life during its previous period of existence among the living. They believe in two worlds-the world of light in which we live, and in the world of darkness in which the souls of men take up their abode after death. Men in the world of light cannot see or know anything in regard to the Silk Grenadines; black, white and colored S. Warp condition of those in the world of darkness, but | Shallies, Bareges, Tissues, Tamartine, Crape Moretts, it is the duty of the relatives of the departed to make at stated periods, such contributions and offerings, as will contribute to the repose and happiness of the departed. On the contrary those in the world of darkness both see and know all about their friends in the world of light and have the power of returning to afflict such as are wanting in filial piety and to reward or prosper those who are faithful in the observance of all the established rites due the dead. In the Chinese mind, the world of darkness is an exact counterpart or reflection of the world of light; hence it is supposed that it has an official, corresponding to every official in the Chinese Empire, from the Emperor down to the lowest lictors of a county magistrate. And these imaginary officials of the world of darkness are represented in the world of in the city, in style and price. light by idols, the images of departed heroes in all the Tawist temples throughout the Empire. -Indeed there is pretty good evidence to show that | we are determined not to be undersold. the Tawist religion is an offspring of ancestral worship, for the two systems are inseparably connected Hence every country ruled by a magistrate has its county deity, with a full retinue of Watch-Maker and Jeweler, attendants corresponding to that of the magistrate; every district (or two) has its district deity; every province ruled by a governor has its provincial deity; and the Empire ruled by an Emperor, has an imperial deity, "Shang-te" or 'nyoh wong shang-te," to whom all the subordinate gods are amenable in the same sense that the subordinate Mandarins are amenable to the Emperor. And as the authority of the Emperor extends to the extreme limits of the Empire, so in like manner, this imperial deity is to be found in all parts of the Empire. (By the way, the name of this supreme ruler among the gods, "Shang-te," is the term used by the English Missionaries and a few Americans, to express in Chinese the holy name of God) Moreover, the Chinese predicate of the rulers of the world of darkness, the same venality that is so manifest among the rulers of the world of light, the Mandarins of the present day. Indeed without a revelation, it is not possible for them to conceive of a higher standard of morals of the rulers of the world to come, than the depraved examples set before them by the rulers of the present world. Hence, they naturally suppose that the former may be influenced or opposed by the same means, bribery, that are found to be so potent among the latter. Indeed the whole system of Chinese worship is designed mainly to propitiate the gods and the spirits of the world of darkness, and to avert evil and calamity. 
