I at first administered a plaster of salt and tar, and drew it up to a head, and in the spring I procured fresh green cicuta (cow-hen) leaves, and boiled them up and bathed the wen in the solution, leaving the leaves in it wholly dried up in four weeks, so that she fattened sufficiently for beef.
