It is not necessary that relief should come from any repeal of the late pretended laws of Congress imposing negro suffrage upon the Southern States. These laws are, in fact, nullities, being utterly opposed to the Constitution of the United States. They cannot stand a moment the test of judicial scrutiny. They cannot exist for any length of time after the military force which now fasten them upon the South is withdrawn. Each House of Congress is the judge of the qualifications of its own members.
