THE COTTON TAX .- The exact phraseology of the law repealing the cotton tax having be come a matter of dispute, a certified copy of the act has been procured from Washington by the Journal of Commerce. The law reads, all cotton grown in the United States after the year 1867 shall be exempt from internal tax, and cotton imported from foreign countries, on and after November 1st, 1868, shall be exempt from duty.
