Artificial Egg Hatching

The hatching of eggs by artificial means is an old invention It was known in Egypt during the time of the Pharoahs, and revived in England thirty years ago, where a machine for the purpose, called an Eccaleobion, was extensively exhibited. This was brought ten years later to this country. A company attempted to raise chickens by this machine, but failed in business on account of the difficulty of keeping up a uniform temperature. This difficulty has been lately obviated by means of an electric battery communicating with the thermometer among the eggs. If the mercury rises above 104 deg. Fahrenheit, or fall below 96 deg., the wire causes the ringing of a little bell. The only inconvenience attending this is that, as the old process, an attendant is needed at all hours of the day and night. The mercury may range within the above degrees of heat, but must not transgress their bounds. The invention belongs to Dr. Preterre, of this city, at whose house the apparatus may be seen. It consists of a wooden box three feet long by one and a half wide, and a foot deep, lined at the sides and back with a thin metallic compartment, which is filled with water. This compartment communicates with a little boiler the size of a bucket. In this the water is kept at a tolerably uniform temperature by a self-feeding kerosene lamp, placed beneath it, which is constantly replenished with oil through a pipe from a neighboring can.

It is desirable that the lamp should be kept full, otherwise the heat would vary as the wick became charred. Kercsene is superior for this use to any other oil, its warmth being more uniform.

The eggs are placed in the drawers, upon a sheepskin, or upon straw or chips. If kept at the proper temperature, an average of eight in twelve will hatch, in from niueteen to twentytwo days. When the chickens appear they receive no food for twenty-four hours. They find what they need in the shell. After that period hard boiled eggs, chopped fine, with Indian meal, cracked corn or other suitable grain, is given to them.

The profit of hatching eggs artificially may easily be counted. It is thought that if the machine is placed in a deep cellar the battery may be dispensed with, as the temperature would be more equitable than above the surface of the earth .- New York Post.
