Extract of a letter from Commodore John Downer, of the U. S. Frigate Potomac, to the Secretary of the Navy, dated Latitude 36° 39', & Longitude 85° W., 19th October, 1832.

"I have the honor to acquaint you, by the American barque Minerva, bound to New Bedford, that I have progressed thus far on my way to Valparaiso, where I expect to arrive in four or five days.
