DEFERRED ARTICLES.

Temperance Meeting at the Capitol .- On the evening of the 24th inst. a meeting for the promotion of Temperance throughout U. States, was held at the Capitol, which was numerously attended by members of Congress, strangers assembled from different parts of the country, and citizens of the District.

The meeting was called to order by the Hon. Felix Grundy of the Senate; the Hon. Lewis Cass, Secretary of War, was called to the Chair, and on motion of the Hon. Gideou Tomlinson, of Connecticut, the Hon. John Blair of Tennessee, was chosen Secretary. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Wm. Hammet, Chaplain to Congress. The Chairman of the meeting then rose and addressed the meeting at some length, in a style of great elegauce and power—exhibiting the claims of the Temperance cause upon the consideration of the people of the U. States. This address produced a thrilling effect upon the Foregree, one and inseparable." The audience. It was followed by a resolution and an able address by the Rev. Dr. Edwards, Corresponding Secretary of the A-merican Temperance Society; after which, resolutions were offered and addresses delivered by the following gentlemen. Hon. Mr. Cooke, of Ohio, Hon. Mr.

Briggs, of Massachusetts, Dr. Sewal of Washington, Hon. L. Condict, of New Jersey, Hon. Mr. Stewart, of Pennsylvania. Hou Mr. Wilkins, of Pennsylvania, Hon. Mr. Reed, of Massachusetts, Hon. Mr. Tipton of Indiana, and Hon. Mr. Freinghuysen of New Jersey. The resolutions were diversified, touching the prominent points, upon which the Temperance cause bears, and the addresses were such as held the audience in profound attention for more than three hours. The exercises were closed by some brief but pertinent and forcible remarks by the Hon. Mr. Grundy. There has probably never been a Temperance meeting in the U. S. of equal interest, or more calculated to advance the cause. In a few days the resolutions and speeches will be published in pamphlet form for general circulation .- Nat. Intelligencer.

This is the language of Luther Martin a nullifier of 188, and a member of the Convention which formed the Constitution. He proposed an amendment, by way of a remedy for the benefit of traitors, which provided that an act done under the authority of a State should not be considered treason or punished as such. But it was rejected: therefore, a State is not sovereign; for an act done under the authority of a sovereign cannot be treason.

Whenever the U. States Laws are resis ted in South Carolina by force, even if by the authority of the State, every person so resisting will be guilty of Treason against the United States, and are punishable as a combination of traitors, citizens of the United States; and the plea of allegiance to S. Carolina, and of acting under her authority, will screen them as little from retributive ustice as any other pretext whatever.
