North Carolina State Lottery. The second class of this Lottery was drawn on Wednesday last in the town of Lenoir. We understand the following tickets drew the high prizes:

The third class of this Lottery, we are informed, will be drawn in this place, on the 1st of October next.

Bank of the State.—We learn from a friend in Raleigh, that the Stockholders of the new Bank met on the 21st and adjourned on the following day. They resolved to commence operations on the 24th Wednesday in September ensuing, (to morrow fortnight.) Branches are located at Tarboro, Raleigh and Newbern, and Agencies at Morganton, Charlotte, and Lenoirville. The notes have been received from the Engraver, and the Officers are busily engaged in filling them up. The whole amount required to be paid by individuals, (\$40,000,) has been realized. It is a subject of rejoicing, that this Institution will go into operation under highly favorable auspices. With officers of undoubted integrity and capacity, who have been tried, and possess the undivided confidence of the people; with a real capital; and with a demand for all the circulation which it can supply, there can be no doubt of its success or of its popularity. It is to be regretted that a Branch has not been established either at Wilmington or Fayetteville, but it is no doubt owing to the small amount subscribed at those places.—Fayetteville Observer.

In Indiana, according to the Journal of the 9th instant, the returns from 20 counties give for Anti-Slavery, (W. H. G.) 15,342; for Free (Jackson) 8,853.

It is stated by Western papers that Kentucky has elected a large majority of Anti-Jackson men to the Legislature. We have not received all the returns.

From returns received from Alabama it appears that the Union men are carrying nearly every county.

John Murphy alias John Sugg, charged with the murder of his step mother in this vicinity, in the summer of 1832, who was arrested in Mobile, Alabama, and been for some time confined in the jail of that place, was brought to this city by the requisition of Governor Swain, on Sunday last, and lodged in prison, to await his trial at the Fall Term of Wake Superior Court. Sudden Death.—We learn that a young man by the name of Hinton, residing in the upper part of this county, died quite suddenly on Saturday the 2d instant. He was returning home on foot from the muster at Mr. N. Lea's and after walking through a large plantation, exposed to the sun, which shone very hot, he stopped at a spring and drank heartily of cold water. He then walked on by a house a short distance off, when a dog ran out at him as though he intended to bite him; he walked a few steps, fell down and died in a few minutes. Milton Spectator.

The President of the United States arrived at the Hermitage (his residence) in Tennessee, on the 5th instant. The Nashville Banner states that he has benefited by his journey, and is now in excellent health. He had accepted an invitation to a Public Festival, offered to him by the residents of Nashville and other citizens of Tennessee, to be held on the 13th of the month.—National Intelligencer.

HEALTH OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK. BOARD OF HEALTH, August 16. 12 o'clock at noon.

The Board of Health report that since yesterday, 12 o'clock, there have been reported by physicians in the city generally, and at the Hospitals, twenty-six cases of Cholera, of which twelve have died, and four deaths of those before reported.

The returns of deaths of Cholera from the commencement, are as follows: From the 25th July to Aug. 2nd, noon 14 deaths.

OBITUARY. Died, at the residence of his mother, in Mecklenburg county, on the 17th inst. in the 21st year of his age, Mr. SAMUEL N. BOPE. When we follow the old and narrow to the grave, we shed the tear of sympathy over them and turn away and console ourselves by recounting their many virtues,—they have lived down to a good old age, and covered with years and honor have sunk in peace to the tomb. But when the uttering of the great death prostrate one among us, in the bloom of youth, the vigor and strength of manhood,—when we see the rose of health give place to the pale hue of death,—the beam of intelligence quenched and succeeded by the uncertainty of insanity,—when we hear the voice that used to speak in many tones the sentiments of friendship and love, sound in the hollow and sepulchral notes of the dying man, we feel that we have at best but a feeble hold on life.

It has seldom been the lot of friends to mourn the loss of more excellence of character, the blighting of brighter prospects, for usefulness and respectability,—the burying up in the grave, of so much that renders humanity lovely, as in the present instance. Of a kind and amiable disposition the deceased had only to be known, to be loved. The affability and urbanity of his manners, the openness and candour of his address, endeared him to all those who knew him. Strength of judgment, firmness and decision of character, with honesty of principle and purity of sentiments, were qualities by which he whose obituary notice is now being given, was characterized. An affectionate and dutiful son (to this a widowed mother's heart can respond) a devoted, gentle and attentive brother, but the record of this amiable trait in the character of the deceased, is inefficacious written on the tablets of the memory of his bereaved sisters. In short, Mr. H. was apparently in his sphere, as near what a man should be, as is found in this imperfect state of being. But were this notice to stop here gloomy indeed would be the picture! Melancholy the prospect! So much goodness, so much private worth, such excellence of moral character, sunk in a morbid night! Can such virtue die! There is a star of hope, that shines far and clear amid the storm of death, that throws its illuminating beams on the darkness of the tomb. A star like that which guided the wise men, directs to the Babe of Bethlehem. On this he fixed his eye, on it he looked with an unvarying confidence in the hour of death, that dark, that honest hour which tries the hearts of men. Mr. H. for the last few years of his short life had been an active, consistent and influential member of the Presbyterian church, and his dying experience proves that he knew full well an whom he had believed—his holy life, his calm composure, and resignation when about to meet the last enemy which is death, testify loudly in favor of the power of that religion which conch down from heaven. The church has lost an efficient member, the community a good citizen, his numerous friends a companion whom they dearly loved—but who can give language to the feelings of a mothers, brothers, sisters heart! But there is a rest which remaineth for the people of God a world where farewell is never heard, there his spirit is gone, and while his body lies in the tomb.

Let the grave be where the sublimed rest, When they promise a bright to-morrow, An emblem that the soul of the just is best, When they shall rise free from all sorrow. E. Communicated.

AWFUL FIRE AT SEA! The Steamer Walter Raleigh, GARDNER Master bound from Elizabeth City, (N. C.) to Charleston (S. C.) was entirely consumed on Tuesday night, the 5th inst. off Georgetown, (S. C.) She was discovered to be on fire about 8 o'clock, P. M. when about 15 miles from the land, and so rapid were the flames that the efforts of the crew to save her were utterly fruitless.—All hands (10 in number, including Mr. James T. Scatter of the firm of Robert Souter & Son, of this Borough, one of the owners,) took to the small boat, saving none of their baggage, and after great exertion and imminent danger; reached the shore through the surf and breakers.

She was owned by Messrs. Robert Souter & Son, and had been just fitted up for a run between Charleston and Columbia, and was insured by the Virginia Marine Insurance Company at Richmond, Virginia. Amer. Bea.
