## TOWN ORDINANCE.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., DEC. 1853.

AT a meeting of the Board of Commissioners this day held at their Council Chamber—Present, Wm. F. Davidson, Intendant; Wm. H. Myers, Robert Shaw, John Rigler and W. W. Elms.

It was ordered, That the street between the Presbyterian Church Lot and Dr. U. J. Fox's Lot be opened at its present width (30 ft.) from Trade Street to Fifth street, and that said street be and is hereby condemned for the use and benefit of the town of Charlotte. And that the said street be continued from Fifth street to the limits of the corporation, so that the same shall be 44 feet wide from said Fifth street to its terminus penetrating the Grave Yard wall; to remain as it now stands, that portion of the street passing through the Grave Yard shall be less than 44 ft. in width. Further it is ordered that Fifth street be opened at the limits of the corporation on the North, and said Fifth street shall be opened 30 feet wide from after passing the Presbyterian Church Lot and the Grave Yard, and the said 30 feet is condemned to the use and benefit of the Town of Charlotte. Further it is ordered that a street be opened 30 ft. wide from the intersection of Fifth street and the street leading to the original corporation line 50 rods west from the eastern limit of the corporation line, the East, and the lands over which the said street passes are condemned for the use and benefit of the Town of Charlotte, and said street shall be named Graham Street. Further it is ordered that Graham street be opened 50 feet wide from Trade street west to the corporate limits of said town of Charlotte, and that the land over which the said street passes be condemned to the use and benefit of the said Town of Charlotte.
