SENATE. MONDAY, January 1st, 1855.

A message was received from the House of Commons, transmitting the report of the committee to make arrangements for the inauguration of the Governor...

Mr. Bower introduced a bill to lay off a public road in Ashe county.

Mr. Walker introduced a bill to emancipate Creasy, a slave, which was referred to the committee on propositions and grievances.

Mr. Boyd introduced a bill for a more uniform and equitable valuation of lands, and to provide that taxes be paid in the same year the list of taxables is taken...

The bill concerning criminal proceedings was read the third time and passed.

The bill concerning divorces and alimony was read the third time and passed.

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Mr. Stubbs introduced a resolution instructing the committee on the Judiciary to inquire into the expediency of abolishing jury trials in the County Courts of Pleas and Quarter Sessions...

Mr. Shepherd introduced a bill in relation to the wilful destruction of corner stones and corner trees, which was referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

By Mr. Myers, a bill in favor of Mr. Alexander, late Sheriff of Mecklenburg.

By Mr. Garland, a bill to authorize the opening of a public road in Watauga and Yancy counties.

By Mr. Gentry, a bill for completing a public road in the county of Ashe, which was referred to the committee on Internal Improvements.

An engrossed bill authorizing the pay of Wardens of poor in Mecklenburg county, was read the second and third time, and passed.

The following engrossed bills passed their third reading: A bill concerning the abatement of suits; A bill concerning amendments, processes, &c.

On motion of Mr. Patterson, the House took recess twenty minutes to make the necessary arrangements for the reception and installation of the Governor elect.

After the necessary arrangements, at 12 o'clock, M., in the presence of the two branches of the General Assembly, Hon. Thos. Bragg was duly inducted into the office of Governor, the oaths of office being administered by Chief Justice Nash.

TUESDAY, Jan. 2d, 1855. Mr. Caulder, from the committee on Internal Improvements, reported favorably upon a bill amending the charter of the Western Plank Road Company.

On motion of Mr. Myers, the rules were suspended and the bill passed its second and third reading.

On motion of Mr. Baxter, Resolved, That the public Treasurer pay to Hon. Warren Winslow the sum of \$150 in consideration of his services for 25 days as Governor of the State. The rules were suspended, and the resolution passed its three readings.

Mr. Sharpe introduced a bill to amend the charter of the town of Statesville, which was referred to the committee on incorporations.

By Mr. Craven, a bill to regulate the weight of salt sold by the sack. Provides their weight shall be 215 lbs. Referred to the committee on Grievances.

A bill concerning Appeals and proceedings in the nature of appeals, passed its 3d reading.

A bill concerning apprentices.

The bill concerning Asylums passed its third reading.

Mr. Myers, in behalf of the committee on Banks, reported sundry amendments to the bill re-chartering the State Bank.

The following bills received a third reading: A bill concerning attachments; A bill concerning the Attorney General and Solicitors; A bill concerning Auctioneers; A bill concerning bails; A bill concerning bastard children; A bill concerning Bills, Bonds and Promissory Notes; A bill concerning boats and canoes; A bill concerning book-debtors; A bill concerning bonds and hunting; A bill concerning charities; A bill concerning Clerks of County and Superior Courts; A bill concerning Clerks and Masters in Equity; A bill concerning commissioners of affidavits and probate of deeds; A bill concerning common law; A bill concerning constables; A bill concerning Corporations; A bill concerning County boundaries; A bill concerning county courts; A bill concerning county trustees; A bill concerning court houses and prisons; A bill concerning currency; A bill concerning Descents.

Received from the Senate a message informing of the passage of various bills, and asking the concurrence of the House thereon.

A bill concerning the election of President and Vice President, was read the second and third times and passed.
