Much more our foreign friend said to the same purpose; and were we at liberty to give his name his words would be received by those who know him, with a force and power which a spotless name, high principles, and a clear intellect never fail to know that there are many intelligent foreigners here at Memphis, and throughout the country, who think like him and that their number is daily increasing.

Let the watchword, then, of all good citizens, whether native or naturalized, be " America for true Americans "-Amerieans in spirit and in political principle .---Memphas Logle,
